## Letter from CEO



It is my privilege to present our Year in Review for the 2023-2024 school year. We have completed another successful year at The Lincoln Academy, and I am excited to share our achievements with you.

In our third year, we welcomed over 100 new scholars, increased our school to include K4-4th and 6th-11th grades, and welcomed dedicated and talented new staff. We enrolled 624 scholars with 144 on the waitlist! The Lincoln Academy

Governance Board, along with our dedicated leadership teams and staff, continued to successfully focus on our three pillars of rigorous academics, character development, and career exploration to ensure we kept the needs of our scholars as our number one priority.

Prior to the start of the school year, we witnessed the construction of an addition to our beautiful building. This expansion was prompted by the need of a larger cafeteria and dedicated gym space. Along with the state-of-the-art cafeteria, the expansion created additional indoor activity space for clubs, sports, practices, and indoor recess; a weight/workout room; additional classrooms and labs; and extra space for scholars with special education needs. The Lincoln Academy is filled with incredible opportunities for our scholars to learn and explore their careers of interest. We expanded our unique elective classes, grew our college and career opportunities, gained more community partnerships, and had our first College and Career Fair. The Lincoln Academy also started the first NJROTC program in the State of Wisconsin, welcomed our first group of high school National Honor Society scholars, and provided thousands of service hours to our community!







### **Character Development**




Character development embodies monthly virtues and a focus on citizenship and service.






## Surveys



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
## **Scholar Showcase Fundraiser**








# **Financial Review - Revenues**

TLA's anticipated total revenue for the 2023-2024 fiscal year is \$15,697,700.





Donations for the 2023-24 fiscal year included monies to pay for TLA's building expansion project. These donations accounted for 68% of TLA's total donations.

All revenue and expenditure numbers are unaudited. A complete financial audit for the 2023-2024 school year will be conducted in September 2024.

# **Charter School State Funding**

Governor Evers signed the 2023-2025 biennial state budget into law in July 2023 and, combined with Act 11, this legislation provides a historic funding increase for Wisconsin charter school scholars, partially closing what has been a longstanding gap in funding.

Prior to this biennium budget signed into law, charter schools received \$9,264 in per pupil aid from the state of Wisconsin, much lower than traditional districts. Beginning in the 2023-2024 school year, funding increased to a base level of \$11,385. Charter schools will also receive the budgeted per pupil increase of \$325 in each fiscal year. Planning for the 2024-2025 fiscal year, charter schools will receive \$11,729 per pupil.

Outside of Milwaukee, local districts with charter school scholars are able to collect the difference between what they receive as per pupil aid and the charter school funding amount. We have long held that per pupil funding should follow the child, and children should not be valued differently based on the school they attend. While this budget does not fully address the gap, it goes a long way toward ensuring all students have access to a high-quality education.




### **Governance Board**
